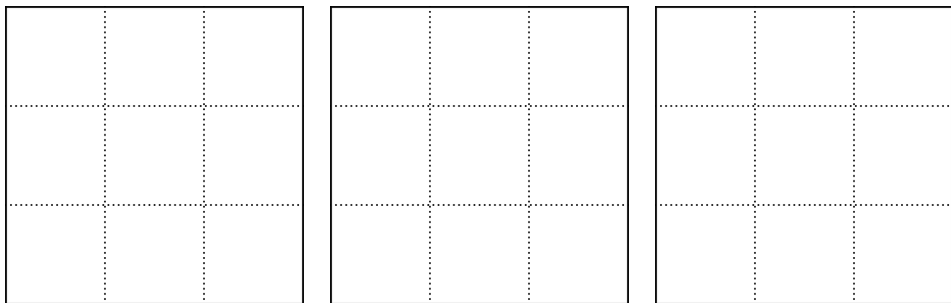
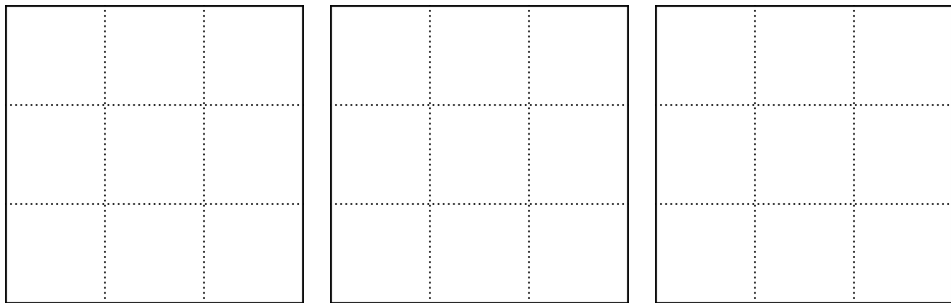
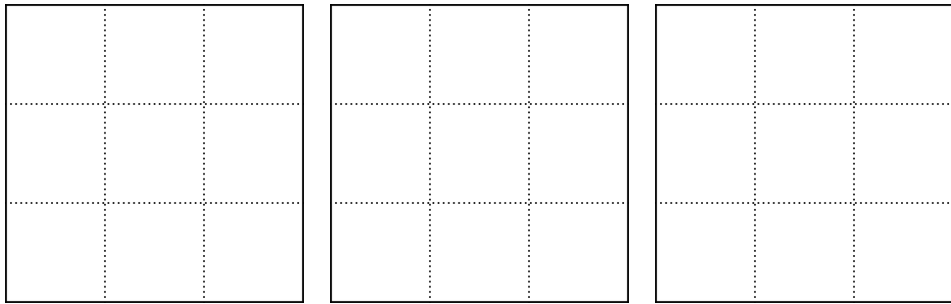
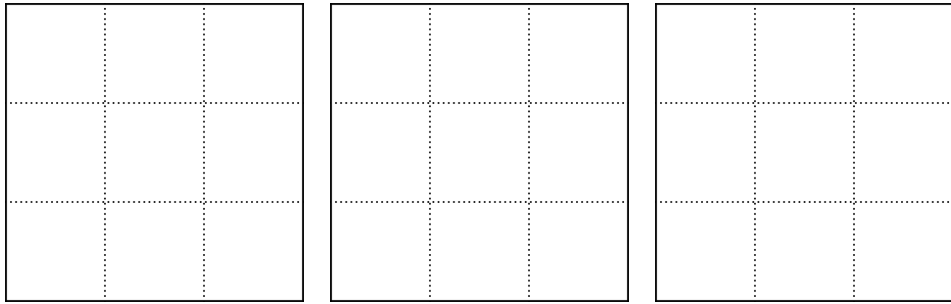


JUNETEENTH

"Juneteenth" is short for June Nineteenth. It marks the day in 1865 when the last enslaved people in the U.S. learned they were free — two years after the Emancipation Proclamation.

Confederate states were free.



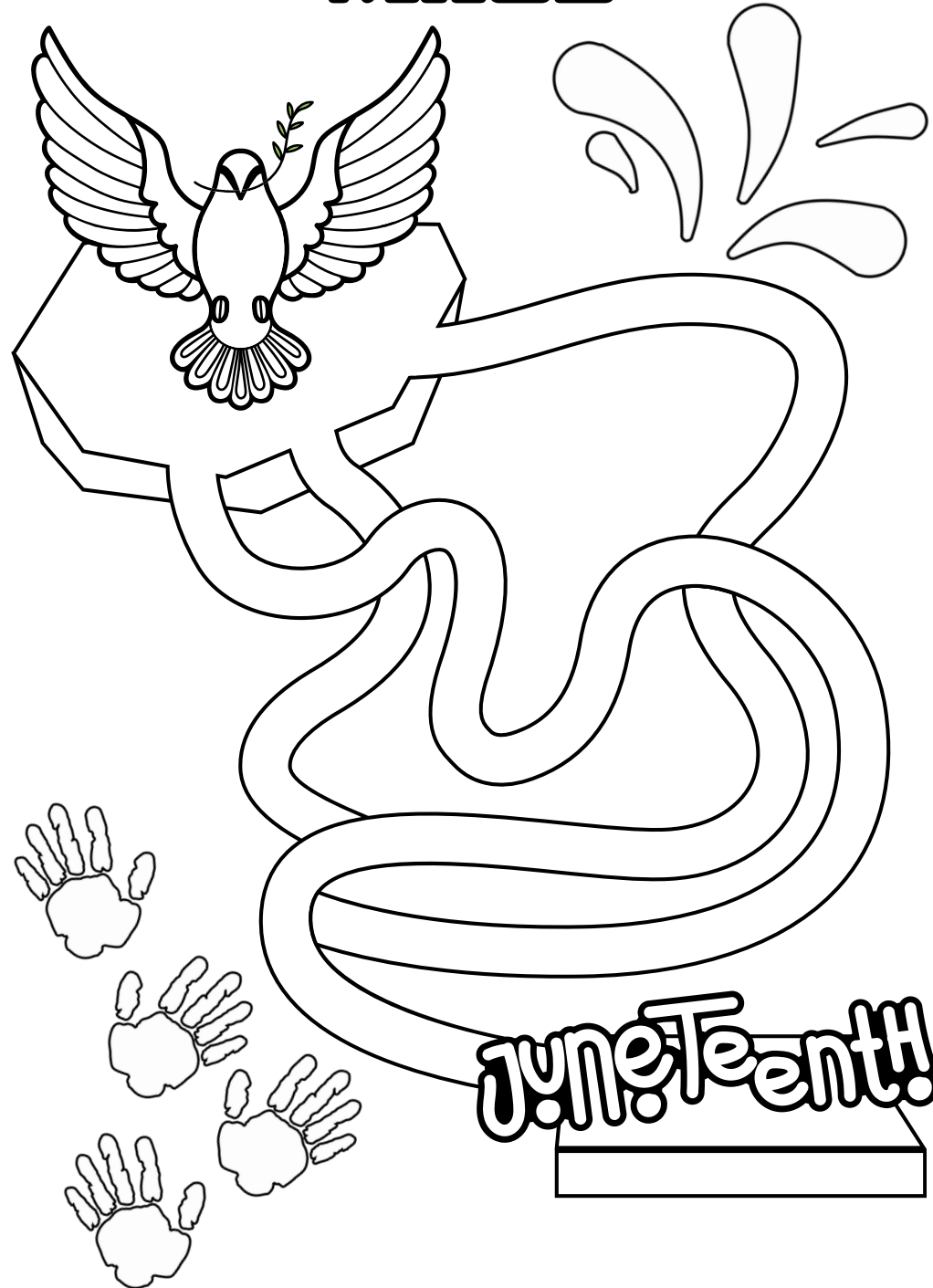

Union general who delivered the message of freedom to enslaved people in Texas on June 19, 1865.



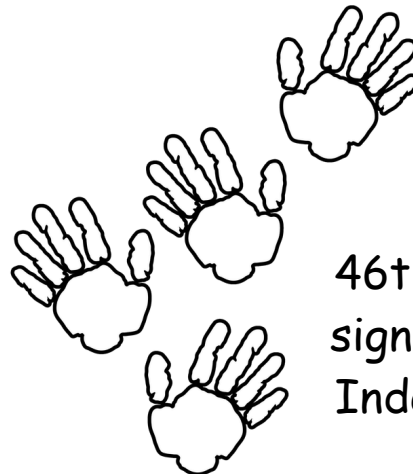
OPAL LEE

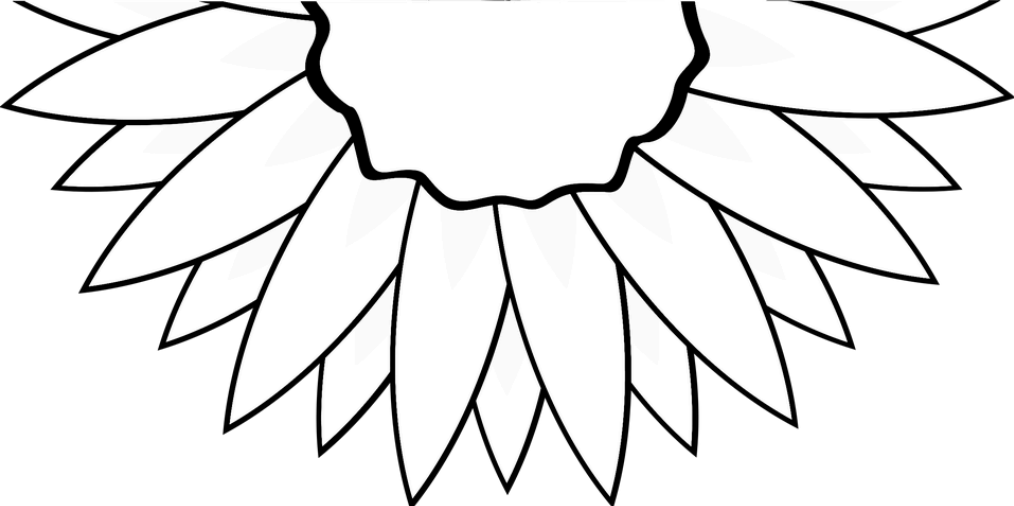
Known as the "Grandmother of Juneteenth," she walked thousands of miles to raise awareness and helped make Juneteenth a national holiday.



JOE BIDEN

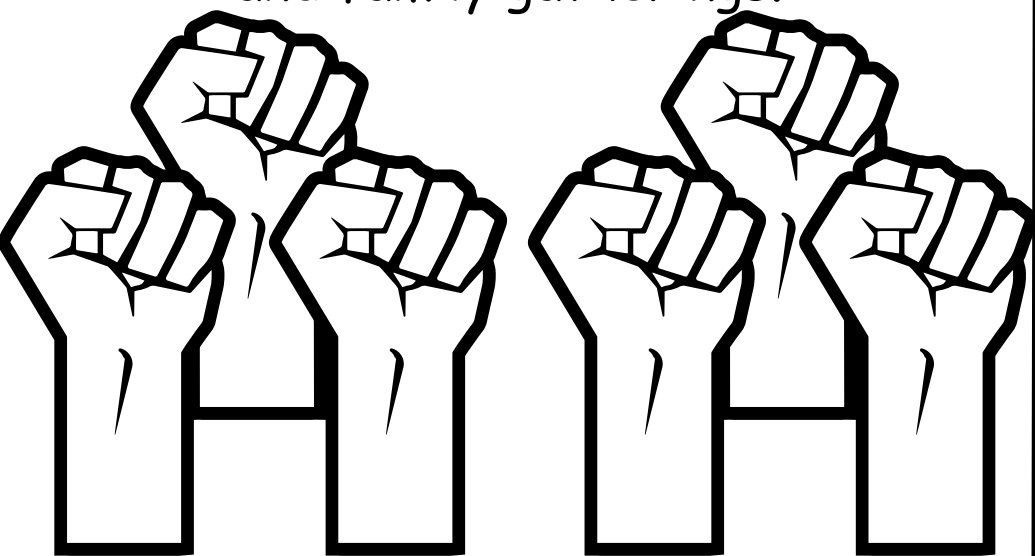
46th President of the U.S. who signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act in 2021.

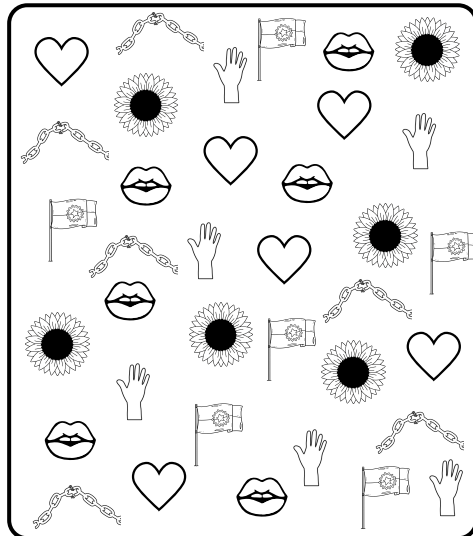

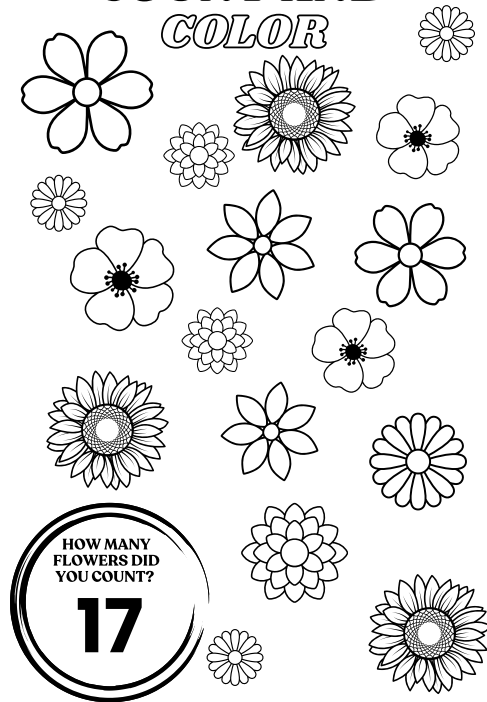
